Legacy Award to Community Champion, Jan Peters


For fourteen years, Great Bend earned notoriety across the State of Kansas because of the diligent work of a community champion whose passion for her hometown was evident to everyone she worked with. Her unmatched ability to forge lasting relationships and find creative solutions resulted in numerous long-lasting impacts on Great Bend's business sector. It is for that reason that the Great Bend Chamber of Commerce named Jan Peters the recipient of the 2019 Legacy Award during their Annual Meeting & Banquet on February 22, 2020.

Jan Peters graduated from Great Bend High School in 1977, and then earned a Bachelor of Science in Personnel Administration from the University of Kansas along with many other areas of study including association management, fundraising, leadership, and more. of their dedication to serving clients' customers is matched by their commitment to Great Bend. This unique combination has earned them the Great Bend Chamber of Commerce's 2020 Business of the Year Award.

"I strongly believe in the service we provide," TCI Owner Shelly Peacock said. "I feel like we're actually providing a valuable service that's truly needed. Because of us, our clients can get more work done, increase sales and be more successful. It's very rewarding to help other business owners."

They're so dedicated to making sure their clients' customers are satisfied, that they didn't allow downtime when they had to physically move the operation to its new home in June of 2019, which for Shelly's team meant moving two servers and 300 phone lines.

"Our customers didn't notice," she said proudly.

"We communicated the move to them and what it entails. The phones were down for less than two minutes."

Shelly graduated from Barton Community College in 1999 and returned to school to finish a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration from Kansas State University in 2011. Buying the business wasn't her first experience at TCI. She worked for the previous owners on and off since 1996, and her mother has worked there for 31 years.

Before the purchase was official in January of 2013, she spent 18 months learning the ropes from the previous owners, and then spent the next five years learning what it meant to be a manager and how to respond when challenges arise.

"We had every problem in the book in those five years," she said. "A power supply went down, an internet switch broke and we had phone provider issues."

But, Shelly persisted, and now she said her focus is on growing and scaling the business, adding services and new tools for her clients.

"I have a great team, and now I feel like I have a handle on everything," she said. "Working with this team is fun and I love watching them as I hand over more responsibility and seeing them take ownership and wanting to be more involved."

Shelly said she and her crew also try to give back to the community. She is a member of the 100 People Who Care and has been involved with the Chamber as an ambassador and on the Board of Directors. TCI also sponsors various events throughout the year and when they need to hire a vendor, they keep it local.

Barry Stalcup, President of Comfort Pro Inc., has been using TCI since 2008 and said his customers are more comfortable and feel more cared for when they can reach a live person instead of an answering machine. He said TCI does a fantastic job answering many of their customers' questions and directing calls as needed.

"Shelly and the team are a crucial part of our customer service and growth," Stalcup said.

TCI has served Animal Medical Center for more than two decades, and AMC Owner Dr. Nels Lindberg said TCI goes above and beyond expectations.

"They have answered emergency calls for us with great care and service every single hour of the night," he said. "More importantly, we lean on vendors we work with; we challenge them with thoughts and ideas, and they respond every time and work to provide the service."

Shelly said a big part of TCI's success is owed to her team's hard work and the Great Bend community, which is home to the bulk of their clientele.

"We answer phones for businesses all over the US, but a majority of our customers are in Great Bend, so when I go to a Chamber coffee it's nice that I get to see a lot of my customers," she said. "It's a great feeling to know they trust us with their business."

initiative and collaborating are the best ways to get things done," says Bruce Erley, Agency Principal for Creative Strategies Group in Denver, Colorado. "She brought all those things into her future roles in community leadership, and is one of those people that makes everyone feel valued - from the president of the company to the janitor. She embraces everyone and builds genuine relationships with everyone she meets."

Following her worldwide tour, Jan took her talents to the Hutchinson community, where she worked for the Kansas State Fair and then for the Hutchinson Convention & Visitors Bureau. In both roles, she was responsible for planning events, developing sponsorship programs, and making strategic plans - the fruits of which are still being seen to this day. and focus to every endeavor in which he engages, and perhaps his hobby illustrates this best: He competes on his bicycle in the heat of the summer on hilly gravel roads for 200 miles in a race called the Dirty Kanza. He's done that race four times and he's signed up for his fifth this May. Despite having battled intense weather, sickness and other challenging conditions, he always grinds it out to the finish line, earning the nickname "Machine Mike" from his cycling friends.

Mike on anything from business ventures to volunteer projects know that's just how he operates; there are no compromises and he doesn't give up, which is likely why he usually ends up in leadership positions wherever he gets involved.

"No matter his interests, he dives in, and in no time is in a leading role," said his wife of 37 years, Linda Johnson. "When the boys were young and playing sports, he would quickly begin coaching, and served as president of two baseball leagues."

From youth sports to legislative committees in Topeka, the breadth and depth of Mike's history of volunteerism is beyond the scope of what this article has room to cover. Some notable points include heavy involvement with the 31 show, including three years as chair, organizing a 14-year-old state baseball tournament membership on the Chamber Board of Directors, serving on the Barton Community College Cougar Booster Club - earning Booster of the Year in 1999, serving nine years on the Community Theatre Board, moderating local Chamber of Commerce Legislative Coffees for 25 years, radio announcing for the Barton Cougars, currently serving on the Great Bend - Better than Great Steering Committee and so much more.

It sounds like a lot, but despite the quantity, the quality never falters. Somehow he manages it all.

"Mike is the most organized and methodical person you'll ever meet," Linda said. "Mike is very humble, hard-working, determined - he never quits what he starts, and is extremely ambitious, creative, loving and kind."

Despite his many commitments, Linda said, Mike always kept his family first attending all the events and activities in which their boys, Chad and Kyle, now 34 and 32 respectively, were involved in while growing up.

Chair of Barton Community College Board of Trustees

Arguably his most engaging and demanding volunteer role is also his longest-held as a member of the Barton Community College Board of Trustees, for which he serves as chair. His dedication and talent for leadership is underscored by the Citizen of the Year Award, but he has been noticed in the higher education realm as well. Johnson was recognized in 2017 with the Western Regional Trustee Leadership Award by a national organization, the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT). Johnson was nominated by his fellow Barton Community College Trustees, and contended with nominees from 10 other states and a large portion of Canada to receive the Western Region honor. As the nomination describes, Johnson "embodies the spirit of an engaged and motivated board member, with 21 years of raising the bar for what it means to be a Trustee."

That dedication extends beyond Barton, as he has served in numerous leadership capacities for the Kansas Association of Community College Trustees, leading peers from the other 18 community colleges across the state.

"Mike is the real deal, giving of his time and talents without hesitation whenever a need arises," the board wrote to the ACCT nomination committee. "Seeing the time he takes out of his work and personal life to devote to Barton, traveling the three hours one-way to Topeka for routine committee meetings or impromptu visits with legislators, it's apparent this college holds a special place in his heart and to him this work of advancing accessible education is obviously a worthy cause."

Mike said, after receiving the ACCT award, the college is a tremendous asset to the community and an obvious place to direct his time and energy as a trustee.

"It's an asset not only in educating students," he said. "Through economic development, workforce training, return on investment in the service area and dollars that come in through the college, it's a vital component of a prosperous and well-rounded community."

Addition of Robotics has Clara Barton Hospital's Surgical Team on 'cutting edge'

Many of you may recall watching tv shows and movies during your childhood that featured a robot, such as 'The Jetsons' or 'Lost in Space.' At the time, robots were considered to be more of a myth than reality, but today's technological advancements have proved that robots were in fact a prediction of the future. Today, robots come in many shapes and sizes and can perform a variety of tasks. Although some robots are designed to act in place of humans, the various advanced robotic technologies being used in the medical field are designed to assist medical professionals with complex procedures, not replace them.

Clara Barton Hospital recently unveiled their newest technological gem, known as the da Vinci Xi Surgical Robotic System. The da Vinci Xi is a robotic tool used by surgeons nation-wide for a variety of procedures.

Clara Barton Hospital is excited to now provide patients with robotically-assisted surgical procedures utilizing their brand new da Vinci Xi Surgical Robotic System, which is the very latest in surgical robotic technology.

"We are thrilled to bring this cutting-edge technology to our patients here in central Kansas. The Xi is a new surgical-assist model that is very user friendly for our general surgeons," said Clara Barton Hospital President/CEO, Jim Blackwell. "Having clinicians that embrace this advanced technology is an extreme benefit for our patients. Most importantly, the positive



outcomes already experienced are now an option for you at a place you know and trust."

Although it is called a robot, it cannot act on its own. Instead, the surgery is performed with unmatched precision entirely by the surgeon who manipulates the machine's multiple arms—all while viewing a high-definition, 3D image of the surgical site captured by a tiny camera on one of the device's arms. The robot enables the surgeon to operate through a few small incisions, like traditional laparoscopic procedures, instead of a large open incision. The difference though, between a traditional laparoscopic procedure and a robotic procedure, is that instead of directly manipulating the instruments, the surgeon uses multiple robotic arms to translate hand movements into smaller, precise movements inside the patient's body.

"When performing a traditional laparoscopic procedure, we use straight, non-articulating instruments to maneuver throughout the patient's abdominal area. Utilizing robotic technology essentially gives us wrists, providing 360° articulation on the ends of our tools, allowing us to make detailed, precise movements and cuts inside the body," said Dr. PJ Stiles, General Surgeon with Clara Barton Hospital. "They gave this tool the robot name to make it sound 'flashy' so to speak, but robotic surgery is really just a better, more advanced method of laparoscopy with wrists and tools that greatly enhance my capabilities during the procedure."

In addition to these benefits, what may be the single most important benefit to robotic surgery is the decrease in the patient's need for opioid prescriptions after surgery.

Clara Barton Hospital is the only healthcare facility offering this advanced robotic technology within a 50-mile radius of Hoisington and is the only critical access hospital in the state of Kansas using the da Vinci Xi System. Because of this investment, Clara Barton Hospital is now able to perform more complex procedures that patients previously had to travel a great distance to receive.

"It is remarkable to watch great things transpire when you invest in your medical staff," said Blackwell. "By providing in this cutting-edge technology, our clinicians are able to translate their gifted talents into their very own work of art, directly benefitting our patients by providing them with improved outcomes and outstanding care."

GS Nurses Celebrating 25 Years in Kansas

When Kyle Whitlow's dad looked at a map of Kansas, he was drawn to Great Bend's central location. The next thing the family knew, OS Nurses established a home base here in town.

"Dad noticed that all roads lead to Great Bend," said Whitlow, operations officer at the staffing agency. "He thought, what better way to serve rural healthcare facilities and nurses than being smack dab in the middle of the state.

"Dad grew up on a farm in Montana but moved to Metropolitan Colorado in 1983 to achieve his dream of helping nurses," Whitlow said. "Over time, he desired to reconnect with his rural roots so Kansas made sense."

For 25 years, the first and only QS Nurses office has been located in Great Bend. Its first location was on Washington near Thill Printing and is now at 1701 Williams where an 8-person team, including Whitlow, staffs the local office. The business recently moved here after renovating the space.

QS (Quality Staffing) Nurses hires registered and licensed practical nurses, along with nurse aides and medication aides.

"The name of the game is serving," Whitlow commented. "Some nurses only want to work one day a month and others might desire long-term contract work. They can design their work schedules around their personal lives. Our job is to help them achieve their goals, both personal and professional.

"Being an agency nurse is an adventure because new things happen all the time. New town, new facility, new patients, new team members so it can be quite fun."

Only 3 out of 10 nurses who apply are accepted at QS "because of our strict criteria," Whitlow noted. "We look for professionalism, reliability and dependability. And they must be team players."

"We have earned our clients' trust because we are there when needed most. There are many big outfits across the country but we work solely with Kansas facilities and Kansas nurses."

QS nurses has served in practically every facility in Barton County over the years. "Actually, you name a county west of Topeka, we are probably in it or have been at some point. We serve around 100 facilities ranging from critical access hospitals to small assisted–living facilities.

The goal is to keep their staff from driving more than 60 miles one way so they can return home after every shift. However, some may want to work three back-to-back shifts, stay in local housing and return home for the remaining four days.

"It's all about flexibility and meeting our staff's needs."

Permanent placement also is an option. This comes in to play when "a nurse feels like they found a home and the facility reciprocates."

Currently, QS has 110 active staff members who are in each corner of Kansas and everywhere in between.

"Retention, industry wide is a challenge," Whitlow said. "There is so much competition out there. We make our name by being a family business and having our staff feel a part of that family. They are not just a number to us."

The operations officer noted that QS has been "kind of behind-the-scenes" for too long but is eager to become more visible in the community.

"We want to partner with different organizations, volunteer and give back to the community," he explained.

For instance, when nurses come on board they can donate 10 cents for each dollar they earn to a charitable cause. QS matches these donations dollar for dollar.





When thinking about Ryan, the first thing that comes to mind for many is Bike Brew Q, a five-year-running staple event in Barton County that features bike rides, a beer expo, and food trucks. Ryan conceptualized the event in 2016 and has grown it ever since with the help of close friend Joe Vinduska and other volunteers.

"When starting Bike Brew Q, he decided to keep it in the Great Bend area because he felt that it would benefit Great Bend; he felt that this type of event was lacking in our community," said his wife, Marisa. "And it certainly has been a benefit, with many people traveling hours to attend."

The initial motivation for the event was simply to add another element of culture to Great Bend, creating a top-notch experience for residents and a draw for visitors, but Ryan doesn't stop at setting just one goal when he begins a new initiative. Combined with its sister event Pumpkin Smash held in the fall, Bike Brew Q raises more than \$10,000 a year to support the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation (CFF), a cause near and dear to his heart as his wife, brother in law, and cousin live with the genetic respiratory disease. The CFF raises funds to support the search for a cure.

His efforts recently earned him the 2019 Next Generation Award from the Heart of America Chapter of the CFF.

If Bike Brew Q isn't the first thing that comes up when Ryan is mentioned, it's likely his not-so-little project happening on Main Street in the former Brown's Shoe Fit building. Ryan and friend-and-business-partner Kevin Burkey of Hoisington have put action to their dream of opening a brewery. Once again, the focus isn't solely on his own ambitions, but a bigger-picture desire to enhance Great Bend.

"Ryan is creating a meaningful impact due to his desire to improve our town," Marisa said. "His hope is that the brewery will help to revive the downtown area and provide a place for families to gather."

The local brew-master has also left his mark on other events and organizations in Great Bend. He is active on the Great Bend Better than Great Steering Committee, has served on the Young Professionals Steering Committee and action teams, initiated the Third Thursday Food Truck events in conjunction with the Great Bend Farmer's Market, volunteers with Cram the Van, added a craft brewing demonstration to June Jaunt and has supported and volunteered for the Flatlander Half Marathon, which raises awareness and funds to a"He makes things happen," said friend and Bike Brew Q coplanner Joe Vinduska. "If you come to him with a problem, he will show you that it's only a problem until he finds the solution. There have been a lot of obstacles along the way but he always finds a way to traverse them while remaining calm and collected. He will do anything to help a friend, and he will do it with a positive attitude and usually will also be cracking jokes all the way. He cares about the future of this community. He wants to keep improving the experience for people that live here and come to visit."

Ryan works at Innovative Livestock Services and operates a couple of side businesses. He is raising

two girls, Emma, 3, and Annalynn, 8, with his wife of 11 years, who echoed Joe's sentiments, underscoring the strength of his resolve and quality of his character.

"He is brave, outgoing... he can talk to anyone," Marisa said. "He's always willing to take on new challenges and determined to succeed - don't tell him he can't do something. He's always willing to help, kind, compassionate, creative, and hard-working."

down into a strategic plan. Not many people can do that."

Daveline, who now serves on Hutchinson's City Council, also noted that after leaving the Convention & Visitors Bureau, Peters served as the first full-time Executive Director for the Historic Fox Theater in Hutchinson, where she helped bring in huge national acts that their area had never been



able to pull before. "She really helped raise the standard for arts in our City," Daveline says.

Jan was recognized with the Outstanding Tourism Professional award from the Travel Association of Kansas in 1995. In 1996, she returned to the tourism industry as the Executive Director for the Lenexa Convention & Visitors Bureau in the Kansas City area, a role she held for over 3 years before launching her own company called Projects by Design. In this capacity, she served as an expert consultant to numerous private enterprises and associations for event planning, strategic planning, tourism, conventions, performing arts, and more.

In 2006, Jan moved back to her hometown of Great Bend to accept the position of President/ CEO for the Great Bend Chamber of Commerce & Economic Development. In January 2020, Jan Peters accepted a new role as Regional Director for Kansas Manufacturing Solutions, and now splits her time between Great Bend and their corporate offices in the Kansas City area, as well as traveling throughout the state helping manufacturers solve problems, make valuable connections with other industry partners, and develop solutions to grow their operations.

Jan will undoubtedly continue to be a champion for the community of Great Bend and all she holds dear. The number of people she will mentor and empower will grow longer and longer, making her most worthy of this special award from the Great Bend Chamber of Commerce.
